On June 19, 2020 our granddaughter was born. She was born three months into the pandemic. Her parents were worried. Her grandparents were worried. It is challenging enough to be pregnant and give birth in the best of times but to give birth in the middle of a worldwide pandemic is an even greater worry. We worried about the unknown dangers this virus might present to the mother, the unborn baby, and the new born baby. Our worries kept us up at night. Our worries were relieved when she was finally born, perfect in every way. Our worry gave way to wonder-filled joy. Worry transformed to wonder as we looked back to see how God was holding and carrying them through the unavoidable worry. Our worry transformed to gratitude and wonder watching for what God would be up to next in her tiny life.

It's December 2022. We prepare to celebrate the birth our Lord Jesus. This Advent we come with our fears and worries too. We are living in the midst of challenging times in our country. The very foundation of our nation seems less stable. We each come with our own personal set of worries and fears about our families, health, finances, work, safety, the future...What is it that keeps you up at night? What are you worried about today?

Folks across our church are experiencing doubts and uneasiness about the future of their church. Does it keep you up at night? What are the threats to your church's future? How can the conversation move from fear and worry to wonder? As the miracle of Christ's birth is celebrated this season, we can move from worry to wonder. We wonder what God is up to now in this day and age. Together we wonder what God's will is for the future of our church. Together we wonder; how can we use the abundance and blessings, (what we do have and opportunities in front of us), to make a difference in Jesus' name.

Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. Luke 2:8-10a

Shepherds living in the fields watched over their sheep to keep them safe. There were dangers that kept the shepherds up at night and plenty of things for the shepherd's to worry about in the cold night like wild animals, predators, thieves, & bad weather. There was so much to worry about, but one night an angel of the Lord, all shiny and bright appeared and transformed their fears and worldly worry to divine wonder.

To you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" Luke 2:11-14

Friends, you are precious, beloved, baptized children of God. We know that the antidote to worry is to trust in God.

During this Advent, Christmas and Epiphany season I pray that your worries will be transformed to wonder at what God **is** doing and promises **to** do in your lives and in our churches. May the miracle of Christ's birth transform your worries to wonder! I am grateful for your partnership in ministry.

Anticipation, Waiting: The Answer

Anticipation is a word we hear a lot during Advent. The prophet Micah anticipates the coming of "one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days." The psalmist prays "how long, O Lord? Will you be angry forever?" Jesus calls us to it in Matthew's gospel. Of the coming of God's kingdom he tells us, "it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth".

Anticipation can bring with it anxiety, fear, and despair. Perhaps we're anxious about the outcome of a medical test, the success of a surgery, or the health of a loved one. It may be the fear of losing a job and despair over finding a new one, or just the uncertainty of the future for our children with all the turmoil in today's world. When we experience those feelings we respond in prayer, as did the psalmist, with words like, "how long, O' Lord?"

One thing about anticipation, the common denominator is waiting. It's perhaps the hardest thing

human beings have to do. Whether we wait stressed out, worried sick, or in joyful anticipation, we wait.

We don't like to wait long either. The less we have to wait the happier we are. Yet, Advent is that time of waiting, and Christ admonishes us to be alert at all times; not to let our hearts be worn down by the worries – the anxiety, fear and despair – of the world. Rather, we are told to joyfully anticipate the coming of God's kingdom.

God answered the prayer of God's people, "how long, O' Lord?" with the birth of his Son, the birth we celebrate and give thanks to God for on Christmas Day.

Because God answers our waiting, our Advent anticipation is not colored with anxiety, fear, or despair. That is so because we are the children of a God who loves us so much that God sent God's Son to be with us always; not to judge us for our sins, but to save us from them; not to lead us to death, but to bring us to eternal life; to relieve us from our anxiety, fear, and despair with words of hope, peace, and joy.

Because God is the answer to our waiting, it is the second coming of God's Son for which we also wait in joyful anticipation. We wait for the time when all our anxieties, all our fears, and all our despair will be banished from a world filled with war, violence, and evil of every

kind; the time when the darkness of this world will be overcome by the light of Christ.

Tuesday Community Supper: Gethsemane Lutheran Church will be serving the Tuesday Community Supper from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, December 6th, <u>in the Fellowship Hall</u> at Gethsemane. The menu is scalloped potatoes and ham, green beans, roll and Christmas cookies. Take-outs will be available, but they will need to be picked up inside. All are encouraged to remain to enjoy the company of friends and neighbors.

Gethsemane Lutheran Church is located at 1350 Florence Street, Baldwin, Wisconsin. This is a free meal open to anyone in the community. Area churches, businesses and organizations take turns preparing and serving nutritious meals.

Food Pantry Support: Thank you for your continuing support of our Food Pantry program serving the five area food pantries: Baldwin, Elmwood, Glenwood City, Spring Valley, and Woodville. People are continuing to seek help from food pantries so your contributions are especially welcomed. Your November donations aided the Spring Valley Food Shelf. December contributions will be directed to the Woodville food shelf.

We all know food items are in high demand, especially during this time of year, but there are other items not often thought of when we make donations. In addition to food items, consider the following:

- **Spices** Think about it. People who rely on the food bank eat a lot of canned food, rice, oatmeal, white bread, etc. They also love spices, i.e. seasoned salt, cayenne pepper, chili powder, cumin, cinnamon, nutmeg, allspice, oregano, basil, and so on.
- **Feminine Products** Can you imagine being worried about affording these? Pads, tampons, panty liners, etc.

- **Chocolate** People don't need it, but think about being in their shoes and how nice it would be to be given a chocolate bar or brownie mix along with your essentials.
- Toiletries Grocery stores are great about donating surplus or unsold food, but they have no reason to
 donate toilet paper, tooth paste, soap, deodorant, shampoo, etc., and food stamps often don't cover
 these items.
- **Canned Meats and Jerky** This isn't true of all food banks, but some struggle to give users enough protein.
- Crackers and Tortillas They don't spoil and everybody likes them.
- Baby Toiletries Diapers, baby wipes, baby formula, baby shampoo, baby soap, baby food, bottles, etc.
- **Soup Packets** Sometimes you look at rice, beans, instant potatoes, and cans of vegetables and think, "What do I make with this"? Hearty soup is a complete meal.
- **Socks** From a former homeless person: "Socks mean the world to you. They keep you warm, make you feel like you have something new, and just comfort you!"
- **Canned Fruit Other Than Pineapple** Food banks get a lot of pineapple donated. Their clients love it when other kinds of fruit are available.

- 12 Pray for farmers and ranchers as they prepare their fields, animals and equipment for winter, and for those planting and harvesting during winter. Give thanks for their vocation of feeding the world, their care for the environment and their wisdom about seasons and cycles of life.
- **13** Pray that, with the use of Advent candles and wreaths, we will embrace faith traditions and practices that center us on God's grace and forgiveness, received through the gift of Jesus Christ.
- 14 "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant" (Luke 1:46-48). Join in the song of Mary and give praise and thanksgiving for God's love, mercy and attentiveness blessings experienced from generation to generation.
- **15** Ask the Spirit to help us invite and welcome with enthusiasm our neighbors and surrounding community to join in our congregational activities, celebrations and worship during Advent and Christmas, and throughout the year.
- **16** Las Posadas This tradition, popular in Mexico and observed by some ELCA congregations, uses lighted paths and processions from house to house to follow Mary and Joseph's journey through Bethlehem in search of lodging. Pray that our recollection of Mary and Joseph's experience

will prompt us to welcome strangers, immigrants, refugees and neighbors in need.

- 17 Pray for those who suffer depression, loneliness and anxiety, especially during the holidays. Ask God to help us be attentive to people around us who are struggling, that they might find understanding, hope, support, inclusion and caring companions in our communities of faith.
- **18** International Migrants Day Pray that we will support and accompany migrants, refugees and asylum-seekers in their difficult pursuit of safety, justice, self-sufficiency and family stability.
- **19** Remember in prayer ELCA Global Mission personnel and missionaries who are celebrating Advent and the birth of Christ in the communities and congregations of our global companions around the world.
- **20** Remember those who are alone during this time of community celebrations, meals and worship, including refugees, immigrants, and those who are imprisoned, confined to home or an institution, without family, or separated from family and community by work or deployment.
- **21** Winter solstice Reflect on the intricacies of the universe that govern the movement of our solar system, the changing seasons and how people experience seasons in different hemispheres of the world. Praise God for a life-sustaining creation that inspires awe, curiosity and humility!
- **22** "Restore us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved" (Psalm 80:3). Give thanks for God's mercy and favor, which grant us new life and hope not because we deserve it or have lived good lives but because God is gracious and generous beyond human comprehension.
- 23 Remember those who serve and work in our communities during the holidays. May we assure them of our love, concern and gratitude, and create opportunities to include them in our celebrations and worship, especially when they are unable to be physically present.
- **24** Christmas Eve Offer prayers of thanksgiving and joy for the gift of Jesus, our Savior, life and hope, who brings light to the darkness, "for he came down from heaven above to help a world in need" (ELW 271).
- **25** Christmas Day All glory and praise to God everything we have seen, heard and been taught about Jesus Christ, our hope and salvation, is true. Give thanks that God's love and mercy, present in the birth of Christ, have shaken the world and awakened our hope.

- **26** Kwanzaa Today begins Kwanzaa, a weeklong celebration of African culture and traditions that emphasizes family, community and shared principles. Give thanks for the rich and enduring traditions, celebrations and practices of our African American siblings and the global African community.
- 27 John, apostle and evangelist Give thanks for John and the other disciples, who trusted in and responded to Jesus' call, leaving behind their previous lives to experience God's presence and love through Jesus Christ and to do God's work in the world. Ask the Spirit to guide, inspire and equip us for sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor in a world of constant change and new challenges.
- **28** Hope, joy, love and faith are infectious. Pray that the hope and joy stirred by our faith in God's love and presence in the world will spill over into our personal and professional relationships and our interaction with strangers.
- **29** Pray that we will be ever mindful of our baptism, which brings us identity and purpose "through the water of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit" (Titus 3:5). Give thanks that we are equipped, encouraged and sustained by our siblings in Christ throughout our lifelong journey of faith.
- **30** The birth of Christ, manifesting God's love for humanity, changed everything, forever. We celebrate the joy and significance of Christmas and pledge our lives in constant witness to God, who embraces and loves us with all our flaws, complexities and questions.
- **31** New Year's Eve What do you hope for in the coming year? What are your aspirations? Give thanks for the assurance we receive through our baptism, that we might live in God's mercy and grace through the ups and downs of life, and pray that we will be supported during our journey by a vast and caring community of siblings in Christ.
