Readings from Philmon and Paul's letters to Timothy encourage faithful living in Jesus Christ. Autumn also brings a renewal within the congregation. Sunday, September 7 – Pentecost 13 (God's Word Our Hands Sunday)

- Liturgy: Evangelical Lutheran Worship
- Color: Green
- Holy Communion
- Readings: Deuteronomy 30:15-20; Psalm 1; Philemon 1-21
- ❖ Holy Gospel: Luke 14:25-33: Jesus speaks frankly about the costs of discipleship. Those who follow him should know from the outset that completing the course of discipleship will finally mean renouncing all other allegiances.

Sunday, September 14 – Pentecost 14 (Rally Sunday – Sunday School Begins)

- Liturgy: Evangelical Lutheran Worship
- Color: Green
- Readings: Exodus32:7-14; Psalm 51:1-10;1 Timothy 1:12-17
- ❖ Holy Gospel: Luke 15:1-10: Jesus tells two stories that suggest a curious connection between the lost being found and sinners repenting. God takes the initiative to find sinners, each of whom is so precious to God that their recovery brings joy in heaven.

- ❖ Color: Green
- Holy Communion
- Readings: Amos 8:4-7; Psalm 113; 1 Timothy 2:1-7
- ❖ Holy Gospel: Luke 16:1-13: Jesus tells the curious story of a dishonest manager who cheats his employer and then is commended by him for having acted so shrewdly. Jesus wonders why his own followers are less creative and diligent in their stewardship given that they are managers of a far more valuable household.

Sunday, September 28- Pentecost 16

- Liturgy: Evangelical Lutheran Worship
- Color: Green
- Readings: Amos 6:1a, 4-7; Psalm146; 1 Timothy 6:6-19
- ❖ Holy Gospel: Luke 16:19-31: Jesus tells a parable in which the poor one is "lifted up" and the rich one is "sent away empty." Jesus makes it clear that this ethic of merciful reversal is not new but is as old as Moses and the prophets.

Astonishing

(Thanks to Dean Rambo for forwarding this Facebook article.)

"My name's Dorothy. I'm 78. The house felt too big, too quiet. One Tuesday, staring at the dust on Jack's empty armchair, I drove myself to St. Mary's Hospital. Not as a patient. As a volunteer. Just to be there. They gave me a faded blue vest and said, "Sit in Waiting Room B. Offer coffee. Be kind."

Waiting Room B is where the hard news lands. The place with the stiff beige chairs, the coffee that tastes like old pennies, and the families who sit very still, staring at the floor. I didn't know what to do. I'm no good with words, never was. So I just.... sat. Quietly. Next to people who looked like their world had just cracked open. One rainy Thursday, a boy sat alone. Couldn't have been more than 16. Skinny kid, hoodie pulled low, eyes red but dry. His mom rushed off somewhere, maybe to call relatives. He just sat, hands shoved deep in pockets, shoulders hunched like he was trying to disappear into the chair. Everyone else gave him space. Too much space.

My Jack used to say, "Dorothy, sometimes the best thing you can give someone is just not making noise." So I didn't. I pulled my chair over, just a little closer, not crowding and sat down. Didn't say "How are you?" Didn't ask about the doctors. Just sat with him in the quiet hum of the waiting room. After maybe ten minutes, I

quietly pushed the little cart of stale cookies toward him. He didn't take one. But he didn't move his chair away.

I started going every Thursday. Sometimes he was there. Sometimes other people were. An older man waiting for test results, just staring at his worn shoes. A young woman holding a single flower, looking lost. I'd sit. Quietly. Offer the cookies. Sometimes they'd take one. Sometimes they'd just sigh. Sometimes, after a while, they'd say one word "Thanks." That was enough.

Then, one day, the boy, his name was Ben, I finally learned – was there again. His mom was getting more scans. He looked exhausted. I sat down. He didn't look at me, but he didn't pull away. After a long while, he whispered, "It's my dad. Cancer." Just that. No tears. Just the words hanging in the quiet air between us. I didn't pat his shoulder or say "He'll be okay." I just nodded slowly. "That's heavy," I said. Simple. True. He looked at me then, really looked, and something in his eyes softened, just a little. Like he hadn't been seen in a long time.

Weeks passed. Ben started coming just to sit with me, even when his dad wasn't having appointments. We'd share the stale cookies. He'd tell me about failing math, or how his friends didn't get it. I'd tell him about Jack forgetting where he put his keys, or the stubborn rosebush in my garden. No grand advice. Just... talking. Like two people sharing a bench on a long walk. He called it "the quiet chair time."

Then Ben stopped coming. I worried. A month later, a nurse handed me a folded note. It was from Ben. "Dorothy, Dad's home. Getting better. You taught me something. Silence isn't empty. It's where you hear people. I started a club at school. We call it 'Silent Sitting.' We just sit with anyone who looks lonely at lunch. No talking. Just cookies (bought, not stale!). It's spreading. Thanks for the quiet."
I cried right there in Waiting Room B. Not sad tears. Tears that felt like warm rain after a drought.
Now? Ben visits me. Brings real cookies. And guess what? "Silent Sitting" isn't just at his school anymore. Kids in Australia, Canada, even the UK they found Ben's little post online. They're doing it. Sitting quietly with lonely classmates, hospital visitors, even at bus stops. No fancy signs. No donated things. Just showing up. Being present. Filling the silence with the sound of not being alone.

They say the world needs fixing. Maybe it does. But sometimes, the most powerful thing isn't fixing for someone. It's just sitting with them. In the quiet. Holding space for the heavy things they carry. You don't need a fridge, a toolbox, or a coat on a fence. You just need a chair. And the courage to sit down. My Jack's armchair at home? It's still there. But the quiet isn't scary anymore. Because I know now: the deepest kindness often speaks the least. It just is. And that's enough to change the world, one quiet chair at a time. Go find yours. Someone's waiting."

New Presiding Bishop Elected

Yehiel Curry was elected July 30 to serve a six-year term as presiding bishop of the ELCA. The election took place during the 2025 <u>ELCA Churchwide Assembly</u> being held July 28–Aug. 2 at the Phoenix Convention Center.

Curry was elected on the fifth ballot. There were 799 votes cast, with 400 votes needed for an election. Curry received 562 votes, and Kevin Strickland, bishop of the ELCA Southeastern Synod, received 237 votes. Curry will be the first Black presiding bishop of the ELCA.

Speaking to the assembly after his election, Curry reflected on his membership at Shekinah Chapel in Riverdale, Ill., where he eventually became a lay mission developer. During that time he participated in the Theological Education for Emerging Ministries program, which prepares individuals for ordained ministry in the ELCA, with a focus on emerging ministry contexts like ethnic-specific, multicultural, and both rural and urban settings.

He spoke to the assembly about his initial hesitation in accepting that first ministry role.

"I'm what a return on your investment looks like," he said. "Perhaps I'm out there in one of you. I never saw myself as good enough, so for two years, I said no. I finally said yes. When I said yes, your support, this church's support, of that ministry meant everything. So if you want to know what your benevolence dollars look like, it looks like me. And I want to say thank you. Thank you for your investment."

Curry has <u>served as bishop</u> of the ELCA Metropolitan Chicago Synod since 2019. He previously served as mission developer (2009-2012) and pastor (2012-2019) of Shekinah.

He received a Bachelor of Arts from Lewis University in Romeoville, Ill., in 1995 and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) in 2013. LSTC is one of seven ELCA seminaries.

- 1 Labor Day Praise the work people do to sustain their families and benefit their communities and society. Pray that all will receive fair wages, work in safe environments, receive encouragement, be renewed through times of sabbath, and experience joy and fulfillment in their labor. Pray for those who seek employment and for the care, support and wellbeing of people unable to work.
- 2 "Let mutual affection continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:1-2). Pray that our fears, prejudices and ideologies will not prevent us from showing love, respect and hospitality to one another friends, family and strangers alike.
- **3** Suicide Prevention Month Pray for our neighbors and siblings in Christ who feel lonely, depressed and hopeless, that they will find compassion, support and spiritual renewal in times of darkness and suffering. Ask the Spirit to inspire and guide our care, support and counsel for those who are contemplating suicide, and for those who grieve the loss of someone to suicide.
- 4 Give thanks for the faithful service and leadership of Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton. Pray that her faith, gifts and commitment will continue to inspire us to work for justice and peace, to love and serve our neighbors, and to share the good news of Jesus Christ in a world yearning for hope and renewal.
- **5** "Praise the Lord! Happy are those who fear the Lord, who greatly delight in his commandments" (Psalm 112:1). Pray that we will find joy and guidance in the ways and commandments of God and be inspired by God's wisdom, love for humanity and concern for those who suffer.
- **6** The 2025 Churchwide Assembly has elected the Rev. Yehiel Curry to serve as the next presiding bishop of the ELCA. Pray that the Spirit will strengthen his faith, gifts and wisdom as he leads our church in its mission to share the good news of Jesus Christ, reflect God's abundant love and mercy for the world, and serve our neighbors in need.
- 7 "God's work. Our hands." Sunday ELCA congregations join together today for our annual day

- of service, celebrating that we are freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor. Pray for service activities around the country that unite people, ecumenical partners and community agencies as we serve our neighbors in need, strengthen our communities and demonstrate God's love.
- **8** Pray for the resolution of international conflicts that cause suffering, violence, mistrust, injustice, economic crises and political instability. Ask God to forgive us for sometimes playing a role in these conflicts, intentional or not.
- **9** Pray for our missionaries in Latin America and the Caribbean and for the Young Adults in Global Mission volunteers serving in Mexico, Argentina and Uruguay, that the Spirit will nurture their faith as they accompany global companions in ministries that include education, immigration and pastoral leadership.
- **10** Pray for faith in the ways and thoughts of God, which stretch beyond our comprehension and imagination yet stir awe and devotion.
- 11 Give thanks for deacons in congregations and faith-based organizations. Praise God for their gifts and service in a variety of ministries, including camps, nursing, music, education, administration, social service, and youth and family ministries.
- 12 Pray for the Spirit to strengthen our discipline so that we might better study and reflect on the Word of God and its significance in our daily lives.

- 19 "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises" (Psalm 98:4). Join your siblings in Christ in prayers of praise and thanksgiving for our amazing God!
- 20 Pray for Palestinians in Gaza, its surrounding areas and wherever they have fled in search of shelter and relief from war. Pray that the devastation and suffering will end and that leaders will commit to peaceful solutions, reconciliation, mutual respect and the rebuilding of communities that can thrive.
- 21 Remember in prayer those recovering from devastating floods and grieving the loss of loved ones and neighbors. Give thanks for the work we do through Lutheran Disaster Response to respond to urgent needs, give emotional and spiritual care, support long-term recovery and restore the vitality of communities. Ask God to strengthen and bless our partnerships with synods, congregations, local relief agencies and ecumenical relief programs.
- 22 First day of fall "In this great and strange creation, with a breath God gives us birth: born of soil to live as stewards, called to love and serve the earth" ("Earth Is Full of Wit and Wisdom," ACS 1064). Sing praise to God for creating and entrusting to our care the earth, its natural resources and the inspiring beauty of all living things, including humankind.
- 23 Pray for church leaders as they gather for the Stewardship Kaleidoscope conference in New Orleans to study and reflect on stewardship and to equip themselves for cultivating generosity in congregations. Give thanks for how God works through this partnership with the Presbyterian

- Foundation of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the ELCA's stewardship and generosity team.
- 24 Praise God that our church gathers and nurtures the gifts of so many through congregations, synods and special ministries to spread the good news of Jesus Christ, care for neighbors in need, equip and encourage one another, and invite all to experience the blessings of being valued members of faith communities.
- 25 Remember in prayer those who are fighting cancer or experiencing a wide range of emotions upon receiving a cancer diagnosis. Pray that we and our faith communities will offer steadfast support, care and encouragement to them and their families.
- **26** Pray that all people will know the love, peace and wisdom that comes from God, made real to us through the birth, life, suffering, death and resurrection of our true savior, Jesus Christ.
- 27 "Take your Bible and take your newspaper, and read both," wrote Lutheran theologian Karl Barth (1886-1968). "But interpret newspapers from your Bible." Ask God to help us attend to our communities, nation and world, and remember that our faith in Jesus Christ calls us to foster peace, justice, love, forgiveness and healing among all people.
- 28 The story of Lazarus and the rich man in the gospels of Luke and John reminds us of God's love and concern for those who suffer poverty, illness and neglect. Pray that we will embrace all people as neighbors who deserve respect, compassion, love and inclusion.
- 29 Michael and All Angels Ask the Spirit to help us be aware of God's activity in the world and to strengthen our faith when we are perplexed by the mysteries of God's ways and the presence of angels and spiritual beings who serve as God's messengers.
- **30** Ask God to bless and guide the work of the ELCA Gender Justice and Women's Empowerment program, informed by the unique voices and experiences of people across race, ethnicity, ability, class, sexuality and age. Pray for the advancement of gender justice in the church and society justice grounded in Scripture, Lutheran theology and people of all gender identities working together.
